Tetris Variations

It's the spring of 2023; prep spring. A violent, ruthless fever spreads across my friend group, sweeping us off our feet, leaving no survivors. It's a Tetris fever! That spring term, hardly a day could go by without our lunchtime Grainger tetr.io duel sessions, with SDPC's, T-spins and perfect clears flying across our screens as we furiously mashed the spacebar. I wrote Tetris Variations to try and capture the thrill of these lunch duels in a piece of classical music. While the piece is primarily based on the first theme of the Gameboy adaptation of the Russian folk song Korobeiniki, do listen for the second theme—it appears at the very beginning and the very end of the piece. I modelled my piece off Rachmaninoff and Lutoslawski's respective variations on Paganini's 24th caprice, two pieces with a momentum and flow that I strived to achieve in my own piece.

Trickling Glacier

"Trickling Glacier" depicts the travel of a tiny drop from a glacier, as it makes its way through mountains, grassland, and woods before arriving in the sea and evaporating. The piece is written in 3 sections.

The first part depicts the droplet as it slowly trickles out of the glacier, attempting to find its way to fellow companion droplets. A melancholy tune of loneliness, the violin's slow-paced melody represents its search.

The second part has the droplet, along with many others, forming a wild river which rushes down, flooding and sweeping away everything in its path. The feverish melody, with seemingly no end in sight depicts the flash flood.

The third part is where the droplet, now residing in the sea, faces its return to the never-ending cycle, with simultaneous dread and excitement of its experience in the wild.

This song is about being the 'good kid' growing up, and the life experiences and opportunities missed out on by living for adult approval. The validation of elementary school teachers and parents can only go so far-- in my song, I tried to express how being 'good' and always following the rules can leave one boxed in when it feels like everyone else is living more fully than you are. People can only be significant if they challenge something (no one makes history by getting A's and only doing what they're told) and this song expresses the fear of challenging anything and the regret that comes in turn. Mr. Sinclair was an incredible help throughout this process and helped me fine-tune the picking pattern.

Between is my take on the nervous energy of a new relationship. It's flirty and fun, yet slightly uncertain. I wrote and performed this song on guitar. The lyrics are my open and honest thoughts and questions about where things were heading in my past relationship. Between's upbeat melody contrasts with the otherwise negative lyrics as it's meant to express the whirlwind of emotions, I felt in my situationship. It's the type of song that makes you want to dance around your room but also over analyze every text message!

The idea of this track came when I wanted to see what would happen if I combined funk and future house. Both of which have complex rhythms and syncopations, which became the driving force of the song.

In the drop, for example, I created syncopated rhythms with guitar basses and offbeat Afro-Latin percussion from funk music, while adding in electronic elements like reverse reverb effects and LFO supersaw chords. I decided to go with a 3/4 time signature for a unique triplet feel and added swing to both the synths and drums for humanization.

I sound-designed most electronic sounds using Serum, while organic instruments come from Kontakt and FL Studio's FLEX. The vocals are from a royalty-free sample pack. This track is released on Spotify under Diversity Recordings.

Jerome has taught and directed choirs at Phillips Exeter Academy, sung and arranged with Doox of Yale, Yale's first allgender TTBB a cappella group, and directed POC-, queer- and drag-centered cabaret shows. Jerome graduated from Yale in 2019 with a BA in Music and received the Aretha Franklin Prize for Performing Arts, and he is

currently pursuing his MFA in Musical Theatre Writing at NYU.



Javad Butah

A disciple of world-renowned Tabla master Pandit Anindo Chatterjee, Javad's comprehensive approach to the instrument reflects his training at the hands of one of the finest Tabla artists alive today. In addition to his impressive technique, Javad's overall musicality, expressed equally in solo performance and accompaniment, leaves a lasting impression on listeners and has made him an in-demand young

artist.

Javad is amongst a few who have had the rare honor of becoming an official "gandabandh" disciple of Pandit Anindo Chatterjee. He has had the honor of accompanying world-renowned artists such as Ustad Aashish Khan and Ustad Sultan Khan. He has played in such venues worldwide as the Peter Norton Symphony Space in New York, the Palace of Fine Arts in San Francisco, the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and the Saptak Music Festival in Ahmedabad, India.

Recently, Javad completed a Masters in Fine Arts degree under the tutelage and guidance of Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri, eminent exponent of

the Lucknow Gharana, at the California Institute of the Arts in Los Angeles, CA.

With a deep love for the inexhaustible art of tabla, Javad is always continuing to learn and develop. His playing, noteworthy for its clarity and fine sound quality, represents a virtuosic tradition alive in a new generation.
